REEL FUN at OSKA BRIGHT FILM FESTIVAL BRIGHTON, ENGLAND

We had the honour of representing Ireland at the BAFTA and BIFA qualifying Oska Bright Film Festival (UK), screening three self-produced films on Sunday 17th March, as part of the documentary strand REEL IRELAND.

Oska Bright is the world's leading festival for films made by or featuring people with intellectual disabilities or autism. Annually held in Brighton, the event screens over 100 films. Our 2023 documentary *Enquire Within* was chosen to close the week-long festival and was nominated in the Best Story Of A Life award category.

Filmed in Clifden, *Enquire Within* involved community participants in front and behind the camera, learning film-making skills, exploring the critical subject of un/employment and real-life experiences of young people & those with disabilities.

Speaking about his experience as Assistant Director, Paul Connolly said "I appreciate the nomination for Enquire Within. Thank you, it's such a great honour to represent Blue Teapot and the Clifden communities involved in our documentary at Oska Bright Film Festival this year".

We also screened two other documentaries – *Prophecy* (2021) and *My Light Will Blind You* (2022). All three documentaries were directed by award winning independent film maker Fionn Rogers with direct involvement of our ensemble artists and collaborators.

The opportunity to attend Oska Bright Film Festival was made possible by funding from Culture Ireland who awarded €2,000 towards our visit.

FAIRY TREE

"I cannot wait for kids to see us in their schools and in our theatre".

Fairy Tree is a multi-phase initiative combining theatre and inclusive workshops led by our professional actors, to schools across Galway City and County. Taking place from September – December, it is an interdependent project that fosters creativity and collaboration between our actors and children with/without disabilities and those who are neurodivergent.

The impetus for Fairy Tree project came initially from conversations with the actors to inform our new Strategic Arts Plan and capture their artistic ambitions. Several expressed they wanted to create theatre for children with one actor saying that he'd never seen anyone like him on stage as a child.

A short story written by Rod Goodall, about the presence of the fairy realm in our everyday lives, was the spark for a new piece of children's theatre. With the seeds sown, a new play was commissioned, and with it, development of companion workshops to be delivered by our actors to schoolchildren with/without disabilities and those who are neurodivergent.

INCLUSIVE THEATRE WORKSHOPS

Fairy Tree is about giving children the rare experience of being led by actors with intellectual disabilities through an inclusive theatre workshop combined with then seeing them perform in a high quality children's theatre production. The message is clear – artistic and professional achievement is possible for all.









REMOVING BARRIERS

We strive to improve the theatre going experience for audiences, removing barriers for people to access our work. Although Blue Teapot Theatre capacity is small compared to most venues in Galway, it is wheelchair accessible. As part of the public shows, we offered two free **Sensory Tours** facilitated by Mo Harte and supported by Dave Donovan.

The Sensory Tours are a tactile exploration of the geography of a theatre space, stage, props, costumes and furniture. The tours can be very beneficial to theatre patrons who are blind, visually impaired, on the autistic spectrum, non-verbal or have intellectual difficulties and for those who process differently.

FAIRY TREE - THEATRE PRODUCTION

Rehearsals for new children's play *Fairy Tree* took place from September 2024. Devised, written and directed by Rod Goodall, *Fairy Tree* is our first time creating and producing theatre specifically for children (aged from 6 years).

Featuring seven of our ensemble actors, along with Rod Goodall, *Fairy Tree* is a humorous, charming and colourful play incorporating puppetry, music and song. A perfect winter's tale, *Fairy Tree* tells a story of fairies so cold they are frozen to a Fir Tree. Two girls notice them and ask the community to take the fairies into their houses to warm up. Not everyone is pleased but it is agreed, as long as the fairies do not overstay their welcome. Will the fairies stick to the agreement?


Rod Goodall was inspired by "the importance of our relationship with each other, nature and perhaps the fairy world. This is a celebration and acceptance that we are all different. The show explores the tradition of bringing a Fir Tree into our homes at mid-winter but only for twelve days. Why is that?"

"If you can't see it, you can't be it' is a quote we refer to in education and our pupils with intellectual disabilities have never experienced a class or workshop being facilitated by adults with any intellectual disability. It will be a very powerful experience for them to be taught by adults they identify with. It is a simple thing but it will have an amazing effect on both students and staff. An equally important part of Blue Teapot's proposition is that our students will then get to see the workshop leaders put their skill into action performing in Fairy Tree. FAIRY TREE ON THE ROAD

Despite some very inclement weather, in November we brought *Fairy Tree* to the very audiences for whom this project was aimed. National School pupils in Scoil an Chroí Naofa, Ballinasloe, St. Oliver's & Tuam ETNS and Scoil Mhuire, Clifden were treated to the unique experience of participating in inclusive theatre workshops led by our actors.

Pre and Post Engagement Material

We engaged Dr. Heidi Schoenenberger, who specialises in engaging children and their caregivers in the performing arts, to create and write a pre and post engagement package for schools which contained a selection of wonderful classroom activities that teachers could explore with the children before and after the show.

BABORÓ INTERNATIONAL ARTS FESTIVAL FOR CHILDREN

In October, we were involved in two events as part of Baboró's festival. Prior to the County tour, we partnered with three Galway City schools Scoil Nicoláis Naofa Claddagh, Scoil Iognáid and Scoil Bhríde, Shantalla, proving inclusive theatre workshops on three consecutive days.

We also participated in a panel discussion **Space for All: Making Time for Inclusive Arts Practice** on 14 October at The Mick Lally Theatre. Actor Kieran Coppinger and Artistic Director Petal Pilley got to share their experiences of what it means to be inclusive in arts practise. While there are increasingly more positive steps towards inclusivity in cultural sectors, many challenges and obstacles remain in development, presentation and especially touring opportunities.



Performing Arts School

An accredited provider of vocational training for people aged 18 and over with intellectual disabilities. Founded in 2010, it was specifically set up to address the needs of those learners who want to gain formal training and certification in QQI creative modules.

Our ethos is to give students quality arts experience of equal importance to required learning outcomes. Tutors are subject matter experts with a wealth of knowledge in creative arts – theatre directors, actors, artists, musicians and designers – along with specialists in advocacy and life skills.



Welcome our New Students FÁILTE ROIMH CLASS OF 2024

Each September we enroll a new intake of students in to our Performing Arts School. We were delighted to welcome Aidan, Anna, Holly, Elva, Lauren and Ciarán in to the first of three years.

For some or the students, a progression route in to the School comes via participation in our Community Theatre Programme, as is the case with Elva (Bright Soul) and Lauren (an original Sparkle!).

All six students start their training with *Introduction to Performing Arts*, a QQI Level 2 General Learning Major Award programme. They will also enjoy visits to Galway's cultural amenities and attend live theatre, galleries and arts events.

For the each September's enrolment, there is year round open application (usual deadlines for submission end of January, prior to auditions in February).

Second and Third Years

In addition to QQI Level 3 programme, second and third year students have a range of job readiness classes as part of *WorkAbility: Inclusive Pathways to Employment Programme*. Life Skills modules and performance based classes take place including the creation of a short film project.

'A Blue Nun's Island!' - Characters and storylines were born from the imagination of second and third students, working with director Michael Patrick Breen. The comedic short film told an intriguing story of a kidnapped opera singer and crime to solve and was shot in various locations in Galway.





MURDER IN THE BEEHIVE

Written & directed by Rod Goodall

On 27 May, second and third year students were buzzing to present '*Murder* in the Beehive' to an invited audience of family and friends.

Started in September 2023, the students collectively expressed their desire to present a murder mystery for their end of course performance.

Taking on the challenge was tutor Rod Goodall, who wished to highlight the plight of bees experiencing an infestation of mites, who devised and directed the short one-act play.

Together, the cast of ten worked over 20 weeks, 50 hours, equivalent to just 10 days to put on a show.

As always, high production values and a creative team of professional artists gave every performer the chance to shine.

First year students were hands-on with their first 'Blue Teapot live' as the Front of House team welcoming guests to the theatre.

Community Theatre Programme has two distinct strands: **BRIGHT SOUL** caters for adults 18+ years and **SPARKLE** caters for youth 12 – 17 years who are curious about performance.

Participants enjoy fun, theatre workshops with spring and autumn terms of approximately ten weeks each. Both projects can be a pathway into the more formal training environment of the Performing Arts School.



AN EPIC JOURNEY Sparkle

SPARKLE is the first point of contact a young person aspiring to perform can make with Blue Teapot. It is specifically designed for teenagers to encourage them to develop their creativity, performance and social skills. In February, SPARKLE commenced the spring term with the focus and goal of creating a showcase of work.

Over several Saturday mornings, Co- Directors Lali Morris and Rebecca Malone worked with the twelve teenage participants, encouraging imagination, developing storylines and characters with contributions from the Sparkles, while also having lots of fun.

An Epic Journey is the story centred on a group of friends on a rescue mission to save a princess from an evil monster.

The teenagers wowed their audience with a truly beautiful performance, incorporating physical theatre, improvisation and dance.

The short play was supported by high production values in costume, sound and light design and stage management.





BRIGHT SOUL

Caters to a variety of ages, with some long-standing members being joined by newer participants in 2024 some of whom had a pathway from our other Community Theatre Programme **Sparkle**.

Spring & autumn terms last for 10 weeks per term, facilitated by drama tutors Rebecca Malone (spring term), Sinead Hackett (autumn) & supported by staff and volunteers.

Performance Skills Development

This group has committed to their Monday evenings with some participants travelling from Co. Clare and West Meath. The autumn focus was on working collaboratively as a team to brainstorm narratives to be developed into short improvised scenes.

These processes exercise the muscles of imagination and cooperation, two vital building blocks in theatre creation.

In Spring 2025, Bright Soul will work on the creation of their mini-theatre production to be performed in June.









WORKABILITY

2024 was the start of a new five-year programme, *WorkAbility: Inclusive Pathways to Employment Programme*. WorkAbility is co-funded by the EU Employment, Inclusion, Skills, and Training Programme 2021-2027 and Department of Social Protection.

WorkAbility aims to support people with disabilities aged from sixteen to become job ready, gain work experience and access to employment/self-employment.

Our programme will support the actors by ensuring they have the knowledge and materials on a par with other professional actors in the sector. This will include getting new professional headshots, show reels and experience of working with theatre production companies.

Performing Arts School's third year students will be provided with Life Skills classes, CV development, job ready workshops, along with job shadowing and work experience opportunities. Arts organisations will collaborate with us to provide access audits and staff training facilitated by the actors and students.

The funding has enabled us to create employment for three new positions in our company — Workability Project Manager (James Flanagan), Workability Lead Coach (Rebecca Malone) and Performing Arts School Workability Coach (Ana Alvarez).



COMPANY BUSINESS

We understand the need for transparency when it comes to stakeholders and funders, to reassure public confidence about the way in which their money is managed and where money will be spent.

Our Board ensures that Blue Teapot is properly managed and remains solvent. Financial Statement of accounts are independently audited and filed with the Companies Registration Office and submitted to The Charities Regulator.

At the AGM held Wednesday 26th June 2024, serving Directors Mary Seale O'Flaherty and James. C. Harrold resigned, and were reinstated. In October, Directors voted to appoint two new Directors to the Board, Orla Haddigan and Mary Foyle, both of whom work within disability services. Serving Directors numbered nine on the Board with additional seven members of the company.

In 2020, we completed the mandatory Charities Governance Code for the Charities Regulator with the only change being the dissolving of the Fundraising sub-committee. Fundraising is the on-going concern for the whole Board.

The company maintained a core staff team of nine part-time employees, one employee (Artistic Director) seconded from Brothers of Charity Services Ireland- West Region and supported by four part-time community work placement scheme workers and project based volunteers.

2024 FINANCIAL STATEMENT



PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY & REVIEW OF BUSINESS

The main objective for which the company is established is to benefit and advance education and participation in the arts in the county of Galway as defined in the Arts Acts 1951, 1973, and 2003.

We do this through the operation of a Theatre Company and performing arts education to promote inclusion, social development and the artistic expression of people with intellectual disabilities.

2024 turnover was €872,507 reflecting:

- Increased artistic outputs including Arts Council Arts Grant of €100K for Fairy Tree project.
- Year one (of five years) funding €82,201 for WorkAbility.
- Year two (of five) grant by a philanthropic Trust.

Strategic growth for Performing Arts School continued with annual intake of new students each September.

As outlined next, we were blessed to benefit from once off grant awards and external fundraisers that contributed to earned income and exceeding fundraising targets.

FUNDERS & DONORS

Gratitude goes to all funders & individual donors who enabled our service provision throughout 2024, in particular major funding partners **Brothers of Charity Services Ireland – West Region, Galway Roscommon Education and Training Board, Ability West, WorkAbility:** *Inclusive Pathways to Employment Programme* and a philanthropic Trust.

Galway City Council - arts grant, capacity building & access supports.

- The Arts Office contributed €5,000 towards theatre development.
- Local Community Development Committee contributed €1,500 for new media accessories and equipment.
- Social Fund contributed to purchases of disability access supports.
- Galway City Council Councillors' grant €26,000, ring-fenced for remedial building works in Blue Teapot Theatre. An initial payment of €13,000 was received in 2023, €13,000 followed and a further €15,000 was awarded in 2024. Refurbishments were completed in April 2024.

Galway County Council funded preparatory work for *Fairy Tree* awarding €1,200 towards advance school visits in the county.

HSE Lotto – West granted €1500 for classes in yoga, voice & puppetry **GRETB REACH** fund granted €3,521 for educational aids & IT equipment **The Ireland Funds'** *Heart of The Community Fund* awarded €10,000 towards an external evaluation report of *Fairy Tree* project (in 2025).

Fundraising Events

- The annual Christmas Swim raised €4,065 by families & friends of immediate beneficiaries.
- Corporate event Big Bang 2024 was held in December 2024 by Galway Executive Skillnet and ICEGroup which raided €6,125.
- Many individuals gave once off donations totalling €3,620 which exceeded our overall 2024 fundraising target.

NDA Annual Conference 2024

Promoting the participation of disabled people in cultural life, recreation, leisure and sport in Ireland – UNCRPD Article 30

A Belief in Equality

In October, actor Kieran Coppinger & Petal Pilley were invited to speak at the 2024 National Disability Authority Conference - Arts & Creativity panel, chaired by Feargal Ó Coigligh, Secretary General, Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

The conference looked at Article 30 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) in Ireland, which focuses on the participation of people with disabilities in cultural life, recreation, leisure and sport.

Issues discussed included the extent to which Article 30 of UNCRPD is being realised in Ireland; barriers faced by disabled people with regard to participation and potential solutions to these challenges, as well as good practices in Ireland and other countries.



STRATEGIC ARTS PLAN 2023-2027

Owning The Space is our first Strategic Arts Plan and sets out our vision for the five years. The plan is built on three key priorities of **Production**, **Progression** and **Provision** and is a response to the positive development of disability arts in Ireland over the last 20 years. Creating the strategy took two years involving company artists, staff, freelance tutors and Board and developed in consultation with arts advisor & cultural planning specialist Mary McAuliffe.

"The Board of Blue Teapot is delighted to be presenting such a visionary and progressive Strategic Arts Plan. Delivering on its goals and objectives will nurture and progress the skills and talents of the company artists and help inform arts and disability policy in Ireland. Owning The Space purposely aligns with the Government of Ireland Culture 2025 policy and the Arts Council's 10-year strategy Making Great Art Work. It informs the development and delivery of artistic programmes and shapes Blue Teapot's role as influencers in the longer-term for disability arts across Ireland.
